AFTERNOON ACTIVITIES (2PM - 4:30PM)

The STEAM workshops on our summer programme are an opportunity for students to experience an aspect of a particular subject each afternoon as a way to explore the physical world around them. 


ROBOTICS



Our excursions include cultural trips to iconic Irish tourist sites such as Trinity College, Croke Park and The National Museum of Ireland. These excursions will bring students on tours around Dublin to learn and explore the incredible culture and history of the city.

National Gallery of Ireland

The National Gallery of Ireland founded in 1854, houses a rich collection of over 16,300 artworks. Spanning the history of western European art, from around 1300 to the present day, the collection includes well-known artists from Mantegna and Titian to Monet and Picasso.Paintings, sculpture, prints, drawings, photography, archival and bibliographical material all feature, in addition to objets d'art, silverware and furniture.



Dublin Castle

Constructed in the early thirteenth century on the site of a Viking settlement, **Dublin Castle** served for centuries as the headquarters of English, and later British, administration in Ireland. In 1922, following Ireland's independence, Dublin Castle was handed over to the new Irish government. It is now a major government complex and a key tourist attraction.



Croke Park

As the home of Ireland's largest sporting and cultural organisation, the Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA) - **Croke Park** has played host to iconic moments in Irish sport & history and to major cultural and international events.

The GAA All-Ireland Football and Hurling Championship Finals, draw an estimated 82,300 fans to see the pinnacle of Gaelic games action in this world-renowned cathedral of sport every September.



Natural History Museum of Ireland

National History Museum of Ireland is a cabinet style museum, laid out over four floors; the exhibits showcase a comprehensive zoological collection and that has changed little in over a century. The first floor of the Museum is home to the lemurs, apes and monkeys that make up the group known as primates, to which we also belong. Many species of Irish birds, sea life, land predators are also featured in the exhibition.



Irish Dancing



Traditional Irish Dancing has become popular worldwide through the Riverdance show. Irish dancing is characterised by precise, rapid leg and foot movements, with the body and arms kept rigid and controlled. Irish dance can be grouped into social and performance dancing, with social dancing including céilí and set dancing. Set dances consist of four couples arranged in a square, while céilí dances can be danced by groups of two to sixteen individuals.

Gaelic Sports



Gaelic sports include Gaelic football, hurling, Gaelic handball, and rounders. Gaelic football, similar to soccer, rugby and American football, consists of the ball being passed through the other team's goals to score 3 points or through upright posts separated by a crossbar to gain 1 point. Players are allowed to carry, bounce, kick, hand pass and 'solo' the ball. Gaelic football along with hurling and camogie are controlled by the Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA). Gaelic football is the most popular sport in Ireland with tens of thousands of people traveling to Croke Park in Dublin to watch the games.

Yoga



Yoga is an excellent form of physical exercise, but it's also about life balance. Training your mind, body, and breath, as well as connecting with your spirituality, are the main goals of yoga.

You may feel increased mental and physical energy, a boost in alertness and enthusiasm, and fewer negative feelings after getting into a routine of practicing yoga.


Debate Club



Glendalough

Glendalough is the 'honeypot' of Wicklow Mountains National Park.

The combination of the stunning scenery and the fascinating monastic history make it one of the most popular tourist destinations in Ireland. The name Glendalough means 'valley of two lakes'. The valley stretches for over 3 km, and within it are several sites of interest.




At the mouth of the Glendalough Valley is the 'Monastic City'. This is the title given to the remains of the famous early Christian monastic settlement first established by St. Kevin, a hermit monk who died about 618 AD. The extensive ruins of Glendalough include several early churches, a graceful round tower, and various sites associated with the life of St. Kevin. The monks abandoned the settlement centuries ago due to religious and political upheavals but many of their hand-built stone buildings still stand testament to their way of life.



Howth

Below the hilly headland at the northern boundary of Dublin Bay lies the small

fishing village of Howth.

A loop around Howth Head is an extremely popular walk among hikers and offers fine views of Dublin Bay and Wicklow Mountains. On sunny days it is possible to see Lambay Island and the Baily Lighthouse.

A stroll down Howth pier provides views of Ireland's Eye, a famous rocky bird sanctuary and monastic island.



Howth is an angler's dream; cod and ray are commonly caught here as fishing trawlers weave in and out of the harbour daily. No day in Howth is complete without sitting on the pier with fresh fish and chips from its famous "Chippers" and if you still have room there are plenty of ice cream shops for after.



Howth Market is home to an array of Irish crafts, delicate handmade jewellery, and vintage antiques. There is a wide selection of organic food on offer like olives, cheeses, nuts and chocolates.

Less than a ten minute walk from the market. you'll find Howth Castle and Grounds where you can immerse yourself in history and take in the beautiful surrounding gardens.

Powerscourt

Powerscourt is located in Enniskerry, County Wicklow.

It is a large country estate which is noted for its house and landscaped gardens.

The house was originally built in the 13th century as a castle, however during the 18th century German architect Richard Cassels was commissioned to alter the castle into a grand mansion. The 68 room mansion was completed in 1741. The house contains some of the finest 18th century interiors in Ireland and was one of the country's most beautiful mansions.



Powerscourt Gardens are set against the backdrop of the Sugarloaf Mountain and are on 47 acres. The gardens were laid out over a period of 150 years and were designed to create a garden that was part of the wider landscape, creating one of the most majestic vistas in Ireland. There are over 200 varieties of trees, shrubs and flowers in Powerscourt. National Geographic voted Powerscourt gardens as third best gardens in the world.



Tragically, in the early hours of November 4th 1974, a fire broke out on the top floor of Powerscourt House and by the following morning the main part of the house was roofless. The house was left lying as a shell until it was renovated in 1996. The house was opened to the public by President Mary Robinson in 1997.







Dublin Zoo & Phoenix Park

Dublin Zoo is much more than a fun-filled, stimulating day out. It's a place to learn about wild animals, especially those which are endangered.

The Zoo is a registered charity and your visit will help maintain Dublin Zoo to a high standard, improve the Zoo and contribute to conservation programmes.



Located in the Phoenix Park in the heart of Dublin city, Dublin Zoo is Ireland's most popular family attraction, and welcomed over one million visitors last year. As one of the world's oldest, yet popular zoos, the 28 hectare park in the heart of Dublin is home to some 400 animals in safe environment where education and conservation combine for an exciting and unforgettable experience.

The Phoenix Park, at 1752 acres, is one of the largest enclosed recreational spaces within any European capital city. The Phoenix Park was established in 1662 and now houses Áras an Uachtaráin, the residence of the President of Ireland, the residence of the Ambassador of the United States of America, and many other historic buildings and landmarks.



The Phoenix Park is Dublin's playground with ornamental gardens, nature trails, and broad expanses of grassland, separated by avenues of trees, including oak, beech, pine, chestnut, and lime. Livestock graze peacefully on pasturelands, deer roam the forested areas, and horses romp on polo fields.






